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Local Sites Ready for Development

SPARK partners with the Detroit Regional Partnership (DRP) to bring national and international business attraction opportunities into our region. DRP has staff that travel the world meeting with businesses in key industries promoting our region as well as availability for future locations.

Site selection is an important part of a company's decision in choosing a region to locate or expand into. While there is land available and for sale for development, businesses usually need a lot of information about the site and surrounding area as part of their due diligence.

As a response to this need, the DRP created the Verified Industrial Property (VIP) Program, where they partnered with civil and environmental engineers to collect and verify critical site data. This data is assessed to evaluate site conditions and suitability for future development. From there, the DRP creates marketing material for each verified site before adding it to a searchable database. Since the creation of the VIP program, three Livingston sites have been added to the regional database, including the Handy Township industrial site which was one of the initial sites to go through the VIP process in 2019. This year, the DRP added the 300-acre site along Latson Rd, as well as 60 acres along Pleasant Valley and I-96. 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Village of Pinckney EV Charging Stations

On June 12th, the Village of Pinckney held a ribbon cutting event to mark the instillation of two new electric vehicle charging stations.

The two Level 2 Blink charging stations are capable of charging four vehicles at the same time, with the ability to reach 65 miles in one hour of charging. Installed on the corner of Marion and Livingston streets, the prices for charging will be based on actual electrical costs.

The Downtown Development Authority wanted to be a participating partner in the charging capacity across the state and add Pinckney as a destination stop for travelers. These stations will provide the community for area residents to charge their vehicles while shopping, dining, or participating in activities around the village.

The Village of Pinckney was recognized by Congresswoman Elissa Slotkin as a congressional recognition for community service for the instillation of the EV chargers.

The labor force in Livingston County decreased by 0.7% or 714 jobs from Q4 2022 to Q1 2023. Meanwhile, Michigan's labor force increased by 0.21% or 10,005 jobs from Q4 2022 to Q1 2023. The labor force consists of individuals working or seeking employment.

Report Definitions

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COMPANY VISITS:

Company visits are meetings with local businesses regarding their current business outlook. This is a core "economic gardening" strategy that provides opportunities for referrals like workforce development training, state-level resources, tax incentives, business development opportunities, cost reduction strategies, access to capital, etc.

EMPLOYMENT MULTIPLIER:

Employment multiplier is a figure calculated by economic modeling through Regional Economic Models, Inc., which quantifies the indirect assistance provided through new job creation. For example, an employment multiplier of 2.0 would indicate that one new job would affect two total jobs (the new job itself, and another indirect job). Employment multipliers are based on the company's industry and investment, among other factors.

PROJECT PIPELINE:

The project pipeline represents potential projects that have been identified, along with their current status and probability of completion.

REFERRALS:

Referrals to outside resources or value-added services provided by staff. This could include a referral regarding a state-level program, a review to determine the feasibility of entry into a new sector, or technical assistance with local or state-level programs.
